Sir,

With reference to previous correspondence regarding the motivation of seditious Indians in the United States, I have the honour to transmit to you herewith a copy of a despatch from the Acting British Consul at Detroit, reporting the speech delivered in the City on February 14<sup>th</sup> by Dr. Bhagat Singh Thind entitled "British Rule in India", which speaks for itself.

- 1. I have since learnt from Mr. Impey that this speech attracted little or no attention, most probably because he took the opportunity to interview the editors of the two leading local newspapers, the "Detroit News" and the "Detroit Free Press", with whom he is personally acquainted. I have informed Mr. Impey that I approve his action in this matter.
- 2. It is worthy of note that Dr. Bhagat Singh Thind spoke at the Detroit City Club before about one hundred of the leading local business men and clergy, from whom he received quite a good reception.
